Inside government - Qualitative testing report

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Participants...

- 12 participants
- Equal mix male/female
- Internet-savvy, mix of task-focussed and browsing uses
 - Shopping, banking, Skype, social media use, blogging
- Professions included public relations professionals, journalists, researchers, policy officers, communications specialists and lecturers

How are participants currently using internet for work...

- Using departmental websites
 - Looking for publications, policy, speeches
- Other sources include:
 - Academic databases, online databases, think tank reports, Opsi, European Commission, ONS, google search
- Sector press, news websites (BBC, CNN, Sky), Reuters,
 Press Association, LexisLibrary
- More specific sites according to specialism e.g. Esis, Worldbank, IMF

How are participants currently using government websites...

- Familiar with the current way of working
- Frustrations do exist
 - Departmental websites not easy to find information, not always comprehensive
 - Difficult to distinguish between information that is for the general public and professionals
 - Lack of uniformity across government websites

'There is superficial information for the public or detailed stuff for the experts but there is no middle ground' *Academic, University*

'It is tricky because currently you have to go to each department individually and its only done with civil servants in mind' *Private* Sector, Head of Research

Views on Inside government proposition...

- Saw logic in bringing everything together by joining up government departments
 - Feels more transparent
 - Allows you to do high level browse as well as search for detail
- Some scepticism
 - Loss of departmental visibility
 - Current depth of information and data may be compromised

- Some navigation problems:
 - Long lists of information
 - Not using mechanisms on left of the page (filters, jump/anchor links), don't realise they are filters
 - Not enough search filters (especially on news and consultations)

Potential for a directory style page?

- Participants approach government information from the perspective of a department
 - Used /organisation route to start tasks and browse further through the site

'Departments' more prominent in the top nav? Or within each section categorize information by department?

- Need to be careful around what participants perceived as 'spin'
 - 'Featured' sections did not seem to add value
 - Language in some of the descriptive titles and links
 - Site leads with News and first link on top bar
- Some felt content depth and tone more geared towards 'students' and casual interest than toward professional audience

Navigation better to lead with departments? Swap 'featured' for 'most recent' or 'latest'?

- Top nav problems
 - Needs to be clearer sometimes was overlooked
 - Confusion between publications and consultations
 - Where are speeches

Rollover tooltip with further explanation?

- Confusion around how to navigate 'home'
 - Participants clicked on the crest logo and not 'Inside Government'
 - Unsure how to get back to 'Inside government' from Gov.
 uk



Greater differentiation of the two 'logo routes' to the homepages?

Shared homepage?

Homepage...

- Positives...
 - Apt for government
 - Encourages exploration of the site
- However...
 - Does not provide coverage of what the site holds and what you can do in it
 - 'News stream' on right hand side not seen to add value

News...

- Positives
 - Many intuitively go straight there
 - Like links to publications
 - Last 7 days useful
- However...
 - Needs more categorisation and filtering
 - Most up to date news not first, perception is that it is out of date

Policy pages...

- Positives...
 - A-Z policy topics worked well
 - Way information is structured
 - Liked having embedded links in articles
- However...
 - A bit light for some ('aimed at students?')
 - Right hand 'related' and navigational links not always used or seen
 - Jump links redundant on some short pages

Department pages...

- Positives...
 - Layout clear
 - Participants really liked these pages and felt 'at home'
- However...
 - Need more visibility on homepage

Conclusions...

- Participants felt Inside government would make their work easier
- Having all the information in one place
- Participants felt department pages worked well
- Feels intuitive to many
- Links within text were novel and welcomed

Conclusions...

- However...
 - Long lists of content and ordering on landing pages
 - Left hand nav needs addressed as people not seeing it
 - Value of 'featured' content questioned? Perhaps term should be replaced (with 'most recent')?
 - Top nav needs to be clearer and options need more explanation
 - Potential for 'departments' to be more prominent
 - Inside government homepage needs clearer purpose and needs to avoid conflict with Gov.uk homepage
